

Fishing in the southern portions of the area has gone somewhat stale over the last month or so. This isn't unusual or unexpected, really. Often, when tides are high and temperatures are hot in the fall, fishing in the stagnant waters of a hypersaline lagoon becomes difficult. However, the fishing in the northern portions of the area, around the JFK Causeway, and in Corpus Christi Bay, is outstanding. We've been catching plenty of 20 to 25 inch trout (up to around 20 in a day) and lots of other small keepers as well. We are catching dinks in these areas, and a few reds and flounder too. Best bite on the cooler days, or when it's slow, is on soft plastics on light jigheads. Sinking Corkies and topwaters work best when it's warmer. When fishing areas up north, tide movement is essential to stir up an aggressive bite. Without moving water, the fishing begins to resemble what you have down south.
